CENTRICA

To ensure ongoing compliance with the requirements of the Control of Major Accident Hazards (COMAH) Regulations 2015, and to test the onsite (internal) and off site (external) response to a major accident within the Centrica Storage site at Easington. We will be conducting a full live exercise on the 13th December 2022.

This will involve a number of emergency vehicles including the Police, fire and ambulance services attending the site for the majority of the day starting at approximately 09.00. This exercise aims to test the understanding of Centrica staff and responder organisations as to their roles and responsibilities in the event of a major on site incident that may cause harm to people, the environment and the asset. Whilst this exercise has been planned to cause minimal disruption to the public, there may be a need to restrict access to the Dimlington road for a short period of time during the exercise.

We at CSL thank you all in advance for your cooperation and apologise for disruption caused.

EASINGTON CE PRIMARY ACADEMY

The recent departure of the headteacher at Easington Church of England Primary Academy has led to speculation that the village primary school – at the centre of our community for many years – could be about to close. In this article, Gail Brown, chief executive of Ebor Academy Trust, who run the school, explains how closure is something that she absolutely doesn't want to happen...

When Ebor took over Easington and Patrington schools in October 2017, we made a pledge that these schools' unique identities would be cherished and celebrated. Our trust is made up of 23 primary schools of all shapes and sizes and it is in our DNA to work with them as individual entities with a responsibility to their local communities.

This responsibility is also a privilege and we are aware that some of our schools have long histories - one is now over 300 years old - and we are but stewards for a comparatively short period of time. We don't take this stewardship lightly.

As chief executive is it up to me to make sure that not only do our schools offer exciting learning to prepare our pupils for the next stage in their educational journey, but to make sure our schools are run efficiently, and we make best use of what is extremely limited funding. You will be aware that schools - whether they are academies or not - are funded according to the number of children that attend. It makes sense, then, that larger schools can afford more resources and can offer an enriched experience compared to smaller schools who often struggle to compete.

Being part of a family of schools means staff resources are shared to make the unaffordable, affordable. Time and time again we all see how tiny village schools are being forced to close because of dwindling pupil numbers. To an extent, because of the way our multi-academy trust works, we can shield individual schools from the brutal financial facts that can make other schools impossible to keep open. We are so very keen to make Easington school a success and many of the lessons we have learned in nearly ten years of operation as a trust, are being brought to bear here. We can, and do, offer the use of technology in classes on a par with schools ten times the size of Easington. We have trust subject specialists who each are at the top of their games and they are regularly deployed across our schools to raise standards and add to the pupil experience.

Since Mrs Leighton's departure at the half-term just gone, Mrs Pepper, who is the headteacher at nearby Patrington, is now executive headteacher at Easington.

I attended a parent/carer meeting in Easington recently and, with colleagues, met a number of people who were concerned, thinking that closure was imminent. Please be reassured that it is not our intention to close the school. Instead, we need to think creatively to plot its future.

A greater number of pupils is the key to success. What we must do is to convince families with young children in our catchment area, who are still considering their options, that Easington is the school for them. We need people to know that they can phone up and make appointments to come and visit the school in action and see for themselves some of the inspirational learning that takes place. I am grateful to those members of the local community who have contacted me to offer to distribute prospectuses to private nurseries

and other establishments where we can get out the message that our school could be perfect for you.

We do understand that some families are opting to favour a larger school for their children for the increased range of opportunities they provide.

This makes us think, therefore, that possibly an amalgamation of Easington and Patrington could offer the solution? The close-knit community of a small school and almost individualised learning coupled with the experience and benefits of a larger school? In effect, this would mean one school with two sites, with a single headteacher and leadership team and the flexibility to be able to share resource as needed.

Our suggestion for a single Easington and Patrington Church of England Primary Academy, with a school in each village, would open up many opportunities – for example, extracurricular activities for all pupils. Together with support from the academy trust, a richness of provision would be accessible by all.

We are talking with the Department for Education, the local authority and the diocese to explore this early thinking in more detail. We want to tease out what this might mean in practice and we are interested to hear your views – please pass on any suggestions directly to the school. Let's keep alive the message that as a community we want our village school to succeed. And let's all continue to play our part in trying to make that happen.
